

Wednesday

Almsgiving helps us to experience giving freely, which leads to freedom from the obsession of possessing, from the fear of losing what we have, from the sadness of one who does not wish to share his wealth with others.

HOMILY, 3/5/14

Emmanuel, God-with-us, the crowds never stopped coming and you never stopped giving: bread and fish, a listening ear, an attentive presence that restored healing and hope. Surely you must have been weary. Surely you must have longed for silence, solitude, time away. May I follow your example and not give in to hoarding that which I hold most closely, that which I want to keep for myself. Amen. May it be so!

READ MATTHEW 15:29-37

“ D I D Y O U H E A R W H A T P O P E F R A N C I S S A I D T H E O T H E R D A Y ? ”

Since his election during Lent of 2013, a great many conversations have begun in just that way. Pope Francis has had a lot to say, and much of it has been a challenge to our ordinary ways of thinking and acting. His most challenging words, however, echo those of Jesus himself, the One who asks, or rather commands, that we love God first and then love our neighbors as ourselves.
