Angels Long Ago

Angels have been around for a long time—not forever, like God, but certainly

since before God created humans. You can read about angels in the Bible, starting with the book of Genesis, in which angels guard the tree of knowledge in the Garden of Eden.

Whenever angels appear in the Bible, you

know something big is happening. For instance, one hot day as Abraham sat at the door of his tent, three angelic men appeared and told him that his wife Sarah would have a son. This was amazing news because Sarah was past the age for having babies. But a year later, Abraham and Sarah had a baby boy, Isaac—just as God had promised.

Then there's Moses, tending his father-in-law's flocks on a mountain. The "angel of the LORD appeared to him in fire flaming out of a bush" (Exodus 3:2). God called out to Moses from the bush, telling him to lead the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt. From that day on, Moses' life changed. And it all started with the presence of an angel.

Another Bible story tells of the archangel Raphael, "one of the seven angels who enter and serve before the Glory of the Lord" (Tobit 12:15).

A man named Tobit falls on hard times, loses his money and is blinded. But he remembers he set aside some money in a far-off land



called Media. So he sends his son Tobias to get it. Raphael disguises himself as one of Tobias' relatives and goes with him on the dangerous journey. Along the way, he saves Tobias from a huge attacking fish in the Tigris River. Raphael shows Tobias how to use the fish as medicine. He even finds a wife for Tobias. She's a brokenhearted girl named Sarah who has been praying to God for a long time.

Once Tobias and Sarah return home happily with his father's money, Raphael uses the medicine from the fish to heal Tobit of his blindness.

He reveals himself as God's angel and returns to heaven. Tobit is so happy he sings a song of praise: "Blessed be God who lives forever" (Tobit 13:1).

Raphael's name means "God heals."

had never been able to have children; "for nothing will be impossible for God," Gabriel said (Luke 1:37).


