

The St. Andrew Christmas Novena is a traditional Advent prayer (below). Unlike most novenas that are nine days long, it is recited 15 times a day, from the feast of St. Andrew on November 30 until Christmas. Don't worry if you got a late start. Begin any time. Give yourself a few minutes each day to reflect on this most extraordinary "hour and moment" and what it means to you.

"Hail and blessed be the hour and moment in which the Son of God was born of the most pure Virgin Mary, at midnight, in Bethlehem, in the piercing cold. In that hour vouchsafe, I beseech thee, O my God, to hear my prayer and grant my desires through the merits of our savior Jesus Christ, and of his blessed Mother. (You can include an intention here if you want.) Amen."
