

MONDAY OF THE FIRST WEEK

It seems that the whole season of Advent is the epitome of that good ol' oxymoronic statement, "Hurry up ... and wait."

Doesn't it?

Consider memories of Advents past. Are there any frustrations brewing in those memories—times of impatience over the waiting inherent in this season?

HURRY UP ... AND WAIT

Advent can be frustrating. I mean, even the NAME sums it up: ADVENT ... it means COMING. And if something is COMING ... well, doesn't that mean we're just sitting around and WAITING for it?

... unless ...

Well, I just realized that ADVENT ... "COMING" ... might mean more than just waiting for something to happen. It might mean becoming involved in something that is in the PROCESS of happening ... even here ... even now.

You know ... like a GROWING plant: Someday it will be grown ... but even now it's getting bigger ... stronger ... more beautiful.

And if Advent means COMING ... then Jesus isn't just GOING to come ... he's in the PROCESS of coming ... even here ... even now.

But Advent calls for ACTIVE waiting. This is waiting we can get INVOLVED in.

... saving the world!

Jesus is in the process of coming!

Torch up the wreath!

It's time to hurry up and wait!

Shhhh do you hear it? Listen really close ... I think I'm beginning to hear something. Unless I'm mistaken, the Advent wreath's trying to tell us something.


SEEING THE SOUNDS OF THE SEASON?
