

Learning about the Sacraments

Teaching Plan

Teaching Tips

Ahead of introducing *Learning about the Sacraments* to the children, take time to familiarize yourself with the contents. Review this handout and how it correlates to the children's resource.

The resource is designed for children to interact with. Have the children follow along as you read aloud, and engage them in hands-on interaction with the resource, as suggested in the teaching steps below.

Background

Instituted by Christ more than 2,000 years ago, the Seven Sacraments of the Catholic Church are not simply rituals and traditions. They are real and powerful ways we connect with Jesus, his divine life, and the infinite and unconditional love of the Father. Through Christ's action and the Holy Spirit's power, God's grace is made present to us in tangible signs—words, actions, and objects—at each sacramental celebration of Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist, Reconciliation (confession), Anointing of the Sick, Matrimony, and Holy Orders.

Keep this definition in mind as you teach: A Sacrament is an outward sign instituted by Christ to give grace. Help the children look for these outward signs (water, bread, wine, the laying on of hands, etc.). Guide them to discover the Gospel accounts of Jesus giving us the Sacraments. Most importantly, encourage the children to participate regularly in the Sacraments so they can experience God's living, loving, healing grace at work within them.

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Opening Prayer

Begin your lessons with prayer. Use the following or modify it each time you pray it with the group.

Good Jesus, you have given us the Sacraments because you love us so much and want us to grow closer to you. Open our hearts and make us ready to receive you in the Sacraments so that you can come to live within us. Amen.
